MAYOR'S ADVISORY COMMITTEE on POLICE NEEDS

The Mayor's Advisory Committee on Police Needs has been active for almost a year and one half studying the needs and crime in Trenton.

Although delays have hampered their progress at several times, the Committee is making progress in three areas.

- A research project funded and implemented by Dr. James Finckenhauer of Rutgers is to be completed this month (August). The research compares the juvenile justice system to juveniles who chronically commit offenses to other juveniles who may be in trouble infrequently. A by-product of the research seems to be evidence that criminal activity occurs in specific families over successive children.
- 2. A committee of community representatives is working with Trenton Public Schools on a pro-active program to work with children who are high-risk to having significant problems with the law. The program is scheduled to be implemented in September 1983. The nature of the program, selection of participants AND EVALUATION PROCEDURES will be established during the coming year.
- 3. The police are presently working on an extensive questionaire which will help the committee refine their view of police needs. On several occasions, the police have stated the view that they need more money and personnel. Whether or not the committee will agree is dependent upon the data supplied.

EDITOR'S NOTE:



HILTONIA ASSOCIATION General Membership Meeting SEPTEMBER 15, 1982

The Hiltonia Association General Membership Meeting was held on Tuesday, September 15 at the home of Pauline and Tony Cirillo on Kensington.

The highlight of the evening was a presentation by Mr. John Murphy, Public Relations Representative for Cybis Studios in Trenton. Mr Murphy spoke about the history of the studio and the Cybis family. Boleslaw and Maia Cybis were responsible for the birth of porcelain sculpture in this country. The ideas for the sculptures were often gotten from costume parties which were held in their Princeton home. Cybis porcelains were first used as gifts of state during the Eisenhower Administration. A film presentation was held depicting the steps involved in creating a Cybis sculpture. Tours of the showroom are available Monday through Friday from 9 to 3. You must call at least one day in advance.

The business portion of the meeting saw a resolution passed to support Mayor Holland's proposal to close the park to traffic on Sundays during 1983. It was requested that a cover letter be sent with our resolution stressing the need for enforcement of the rules, regulations and laws of the City of Trenton that concern the park.

Highlights of the meeting are in other articles in this Hilltone.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT

The City of Trenton has been awarded a \$20,00 matching funds grated for a total of \$40,000 per year from the Green Acres Fund for a three year program of improvements in Cadwalader Park. The following projects will be undertaken: correction of the erosion problem rehabilitation of the dam, improvement to drainage areas, repair of the dam, improvements in the playground and additional walkway improvements.

COSMOS, HERE WE COME!

The City of Trenton, Parks and Recreation provided tickets and transportation to the Meadowlands to see the Cosmos Soccer Team on Wednesday, August 11 for the children in the City. PARKS IN THE NEWS . . .

- * The cherry trees no longer are blooming because park patrons are parking their cars on the grass, which compacts the soil, preventing water from reaching the roots. Parking on the grass also is threatening the trees that provide shade for picnickers.
- * Throwing trash in the park is illegal and carries a \$100 fine.
- Many car owners bring their vehicles to the park to work on them, further threatening the grass, trees, plants and flowers. An oil change, for example, often means several quarts of dirty oil dumped on the grass -- deadly for growing things.
- * At times, there are more vehicles in the park than there are parking spaces.
- * Some of the facilities at the park, such as tennis courts, are in disrepair.

I bet that you think this was recently written about Cadwalader Park. The above points were written by Jean Blevins of the New American Staff and appeared in a Baltimore, Maryland newspaper. Ms. Blevins is writing about Druid Hill Park in Baltimore, another Olmsted Park. Druid Hill Park is 648 acres while Cadwalader Park is 147 acres but both parks have the same problems indicative of an urban park. Howard Fennell, superintendent of the Druid Hill District of the City Parks and Recreation Department says, "People are killing the park without even knowing."

One of the challenges of a city are to find ways to cope with not only these problems but aiso the problems which are unique to the particular park environment. Citizens have a right to question whether or not the city can indeed fulfill its obligation to its park lands. Questioning Trenton's ability to keep our park alive is definitely not out of order.

Like Druid Hill Par, Trenton has the Friends of Cadwalader Park. The Friends of Druid Hill Park scored a major victory this spring by closing to vehicles a road that circles a large reservoir in the park. Now the road is open to bikers, joggers, skaters and walkers. This is a means of offering safety to the Park and its users. The Friends of Cadwalader Park hope to accomplish this next year.

With tax monies in great demand and cities with their already short supply of recreational activities, we need to take care and be proud of what WE have. A park like Cadwalader is an asset to the City as long as it doesn't die.

Over the past several weeks, Hiltonia has been experiencing progress in the making. The City, through an independent contractor, has been relining the water mains. The purpose of this relining is to increase water pressure and flow. The job is to take approximately 8 weeks to complete.

The Hiltonia Association has been in touch with Mr. Tucillo, City Department of Public Works, about repaving our streets when the project is completed. Public Service will also be contacted so that any updating of our gas lines will be done before any repaving takes place. Mr. Cacallori, Trenton's Water Main Project Supervisor, will contact Mr. Tucillo about leaf pick up during the project. We are encouraged to put our leaves in garbage bags as much as possible.

EDITORIAL COMMENT

Happy to See Summer End

I never thought I'd see the day that I would be happy to see my most favorite season, summer, come to an end, but having watched the past seven summers in Cadwalader Park, it has become a welcome relief to see the summer pass by. Of course, living on the Park street certainly brings one closer to nature and to the problems associated with man and nature. It is most difficult to have to watch things going on in front of you which are very much against your upbringing and your philosophy on living and not be able to walk away because you live there. It's your home.

Just tonight a few bags of garbage came out of the Park. It included several obvious Michelob bottles. Living with trash in your gutter everyday is common. But after 7 years, I still cannot accept it. I would take my garbage home, why can't other people? The other night, a motorcycle was parked across the street. It pulled away with a crash as its riders threw a bottle in the middle of the street -- an act of defiance.

Within two weeks, with family in tow in the family wagon, we twice saw two men relieving themselves in the park. And this is within 200 feet of my front door.

We attended the Gino Mule band concert in the park, all 15 people, but it was drowned out by hard rock blaring from a black volkswagon parked not too far away. Ken went over and asked them to please turn it down. But arrogance won! The Park Police were asked to intercede but to no avail. The Trenton Police sat on the lawn in their van. Should the world come to accept this kind of behavior? Have we really come that far away from being considerate to other people? I personally feel that the police and City owe Mr. Mule an apology. It was really embarassing. This incident was called to Mr. Nat Cobb's (Director of Parks and Recreation) attention. His comment was that if you ask the music to be turned down, then those poeple can ask that the visiting concert be turned down. That rationalization makes very little sense.

I no longer want to be embarassed when we have company for dinner and you can't carry on a conversation because of the music pouring out of the park. There are noise ordinances in this City but did you ever try to get them enforced. If the ordinances are not strong enough than make them stronger. I don't want to apologize to anyone for visiting me.

And my own neighbors plus others who have turned the Park into a Dog Sewer. I just love to watch people who pull up open their car doors to let their dog out loose in the park. I don't blame them for not wanting to clean up after their dog. How often do you need to clean your kid's sneakers? How can people use the Park for what it is intended for? I know you love your dogs and I realize the problems you have but there are so many of you. The City has a pooper scooper law and a leash law. Does anyone remember?

People park in front of our house, 2:00 AM, 3:00 AM, 4:00 AM, there is no time limit. Don't they know that people live in these houses? I lay in bed and hear bottles thrown out of car windows into fences or on the street, music blaring through the windows and doors slamming. Don't they realize that you can hear every word of their conversations or music in the quiet of the summer's night. The Park is closed at 10:00 PM and we live here, yet I have heard police apologize for asking people to move.


