#### **CRIME WATCH**

Vehicles are often parked in Hiltonia which seem to have no connection to Hiltonia residents. The Hiltonia Crime Watch is instituting a program to record data on these vehicles and hopefully reduce their number.

Our attempt is based upon the idea that if vehicles in our region are to used for nefarious acts, the driver is not likely to want data identifying the vehicle to be recorded. If the information is recorded and the driver knows it, the driver is less likely to return.

We have developed a card which we hope you will use whenever you see a vehicle parked in your area which you can not identify. The card which was suggested by Rita LaBel and printed by Four Way Printing Co. has perforations down the middle.

The left half of the card says the following:

#### "ATTENTION:

All cars parked in Hiltonia which are not known to Hiltonia residents are considered suspicious. Your license number and car description have been recorded.

#### HILTONIA CRIME WATCH"

This half should be placed under the windshield wiper of the vehicle.

The right half of the card has room for information such as date, location, and description of the vehicle. (continued on next page)

Please fill out as much detail as you can about the vehicle and RETURN THE CARD TO GLENN PALMER, 205 RENFREW! The cards should have your signature on the back so that you can be contacted in case there are any questions. A phone number would also help.

PLEASE USE THE CARD ON ANY VEHICLE IN YOUR AREAS WHICH YOU FEEL IS SUSPICIOUS. WE HAVE PLENTY OF CARDS. ADDITIONAL CARDS CAN BE PICKED UP AT 205 RENFREW; PLEASE CALL 393-0103 TO ENSURE THAT WE ARE HOME.

NOTE: WHEN THERE ARE BREAK-INS IN THE AREA, I WILL GO OVER THE CARDS RETURNED FOR THAT DAY AND ASK THE POLICE TO IDENTIFY THE DESCRIBED VEHICLES. IN THIS WAY WE MAY BE ABLE TO PROVIDE IMPORTANT LEADS TO THE POLICE. IF YOU HAVE A CARD FOR THE DAY OF AN INCIDENT, PLEASE RETURN IT ASAP TO PROVIDE WHAT MIGHT BE CRUCIAL INFORMATION. REMEMBER, IT'S BETTER TO HAND THE CARDS IN LATE THAN NOT AT ALL!

Your use of the cards will have at least two benefits:

- 1. The vehicle driver will know that someone was watching.
- 2.We will have a description of vehicles parked in our area.

No one should feel disturbed if they get such a card on their windshield. It merely says that we are watching. PLEASE USE THE CARD AND RETURN THE RIGHT HALF! As the Kytes' know, burglars are still working our area.

# SAUSAGE AND EGG CASSEROLE

#### Ingredients:

1lb. pork sausage (bulk)

9 eggs

3 cups milk

11/2 tsp. dry mustard

1 tsp. salt

4 slices bread, remove crusts and cube

11/2 cups shredded cheddar cheese

#### Procedure:

Cook sausage thoroughly, stirring to crumble.

Drain on paper towel, to eliminate any greasiness.

Beat eggs with milk, salt and dry mustard.

Add bread cubes, cheese and sausage. Mix well.

Pour into well greased 13 X 9 X 2 baking pan.

Refrigerate COVERED overnight. Bake UNCOVERED at 350 oven for 1 hour.





# Adventures of a Purse Snatcher's Victim

To the Editor:

Someone in New York City is pretending to be me, and I don't like it.

My purse was stolen in New York on April 5. Naturally, in it were all the items one could expect to find in a lady's pocketbook: a wailet containing cash, driver's license, credit cards, business cards and pictures of my children; glasses, gloves, checkbook, diary, makeup and personal accourtements we women carry around.

I was in a state of shock. Still, I think I did everything that I was supposed to do to protect myself, and others, against further loss. I reported the theft to the police, I canceled my bank credit cards within four and a half hours, closed out my bank accounts and reported the theft to my insurance carrier. I innocently imagined that everything was under control.

Wrong! Evidently my bank credit card was used within a couple of hours, and at least two checks have been forged thus far. To boot, bona fide checks that hadn't cleared for payment bounced, and the insurance company has required notarized proof of ownership and cost of all stolen items. All of this, and I couldn't even read for three days because I had no glasses.

But worst of all, somehow I, too, seem to be suspect. I don't have any ID, and the person who has the contents of my purse is apparently having less trouble assuming my identity than I have in re-establishing mine.

As a result of my misfortune, I'd like to pose a few suggestions to credit card issuers and to women who are potential targets for purse thieves: 'Could a picture of the credit card owner be laminated onto the card?

<sup>7</sup>Could pictures be taken of all card users and be kept in a master file for verification purposes?

'Could all cardholders, in addition to a signature and number, also have their own password, not noted on the cards? Verification by the bank or credit office would be simple. If the password is wrong, you've probably caught a crook.

My advice to women: carry as little as possible in your bag. Carry only one or two blank checks and as few credit cards as absolutely necessary. The less of value, the better. In addition, get the names of all people at stores and banks when you call to cancel your charge accounts [one store had no record of my call]. Better yet, follow up in writing and request a reply. If you don't get a response, go in and see them. It's a hassle, but at least they'll know you're you if you show your face.


#### A SUMMER GUEST





Mary Ellen Schragger of Hilvista has been installed as vice president of the Villa Victoria PTA.



# AN ANSWER

Mr. William Guhl, City Finance Director responded to the Editorial -- 'Water Crazy' which appeared in the June 1, 1981 issue of the Hilltone by telephone conversation on June 22, 1981.

The City has been faced with problems in the data processing department due to numerous resignations. This has caused a back log in work that requires use of these facilities. This problem is now under control and the Water Works hopes to return to a quarterly schedule in 1982.

In Hiltonia, the meters were read on or about June 2. If you were not home you will be receiving an estimated bill. The meter reader will no longer leave a card on your door knob because of security reasons.[It is a note declaring that the house is empty.] City meters were read anywhere from June 1 through June 30 with billing to follow around August 1. This billing is for the period February 26,27, or 28 through June 2,3, or 4.

The next meter reading will occur in the month of October and billing will occur on or about December 1. The service charges will be pro-rated since the rate is based on an annual fee.

Beginning in 1982, the meters will be read in the months of January, April, July and October with billing to follow on or about March I, June I, September I and December I. It is fairly reasonable to assume that the meters in Hiltonia will be read during the first week of the month.

Where has the money been coming from to operate the utility? First of all bills to Ewing, Lawrence and Hamilton users have not been delayed as the Trenton bills were. These users account for more than half of the Trenton Water Works' customers and they are governed by the P.U.C. regulations. These users also provide greater revenues than City users.

Secondly, the money was available through inter-Fund Accounts. The water utility capital funds that were not being used were diverted to daily operations. The city taxes were not used by the Water Works.

if you're worried about what all this back log is doing to your sewer bill, you need not worry any longer. When the next sewer bill arrives, it will be calculated on a different consumption period, although the rates remain unchanged. You will be billed in advance for the six month period beginning July 1. The charge will be based on the amount of water consumed during the most recent consumption period and pro-rated over a 6 month period. This should avoid most problems that were caused by the erratic meter readings. The sewer bill for average water usage is \$24.00 bi-annually based on 4,800 cu. ft. The average water bill is between 2,000 and 2,500 cu. ft. per quarter.
