HERITAGE DAYS

More than 120 ethnic, church, and civic groups are now preparing to welcome 150,000 people to Trenton for the City's 3rd Annual Heritage Days.

Heritage Days is a two day food and entertainment extravaganza sponsored by the Trenton Commons Commission and takes place on the Commons and in Mill Hill Park. The hours are Saturday, June 6 from 10 AM to 6 PM and Sunday, June 7 from Noon to 6 PM. The is NO admission charge and parking is free.

This year there will be 43 food booths compared to last year's 23. If you have always wanted to try something, now is the time. Many of the food booths will be selling food in sample sizes at a very reasonable price. This enables you to try many different dishes. Remember to make your choices wisely and save room for what you really want to try. Some foods that you can try are kugel, mulligataway stew, pansit, curry bread, curried goat, pigs feet, borscht, and black bread. Has your apetite been aroused?

There will also be 90 quality craft exhibits from all over the State and continuous entertainment in the park – a place to rest your weary feet and stuffed stomach.



HILTONIA: NOT A STEREOTYPE

Almost anyone can tell you about Hiltonia. What they tell you depends, of course, on who they are and where they themselves live. For those of you who may be considering Hiltonia as a place to call home, the views and opinions of those who live here might be helpful to you.

For the record, Hiltonia is located in the City of Trenton, west of Cadwalader Park and north of the Delaware-Raritan Canai. The neighborhood consists of about 309 homes of every size and description from English Tudors and Dutch Colonials to California Contemporaries and semi-detached row houses. It is a quiet neighborhood which, apart from its attractive appearance, offers the prospective home buyer many amenities seldom found in other places.

Perhaps the single greatest amenity Hiltonia offers is the quality of the homes. Sample the listings of homes which may be available at any given time and you will find that dollar for dollar your money will buy a larger home with more of the features you want (eg. fireplaces, pools, wet bars and even tennis courts!) than can be found anywhere else. Virtually every home in Hiltonia was custom built, some over 50 years ago when lathe and plaster was the standard for walls and tongue-in-groove hardwood the standard for floors. On this point, most visitors would agree: Hiltonia has some of the finest homes in Mercer County.

Another amenity worthy of consideration is location. Hiltonia is very conveniently located, just minutes away from State offices, Trenton State College, Mercer Airport, Mercer Hospital and the Trenton Country Club. For state and local govern ment employees especially, the commute to work is short indeed. Hiltonia is well served by the T-HILTONIA route of the Mercer Metro bus line which reliably transports New York and Philadelphia commuters to the Trenton Train Station three times every hour. This obviates the need for parking or in some cases, owning a second car.

One of the amenities most often cited by new arrivals as a reason for choosing Hiltonia is the community spirit of the residents. Don't be fooled by popular stereotypes from a bygone era. Hiltonia is a diverse community of young and old, black and white, rich and not so rich. Above all, it is a family neighborhood with children in all age groups. Simply stated, the families who live in Hiltonia, like Hiltonia and each other. The resident civic association publishes a bi-monthly newsletter, organizes special events, and welcomes all new arrivals with champaigne and cheese, Won't you join us?

THE CITY EXPANDS WESTWARD

The opening of Cadwalader Park in 1901 pushed housing out to the western fringes of the city. Once it became known that Frederick Law Olmsted, the architect of New York's Central Park, had agreed to design an urban park in Trenton, developers started drawing up housing plans to trade on the new park's popularity.

In 1891, the westerly line of the city was still at Overbrook Avenue. State Street was altered and widened to 100 feet through the Cadwalader and Atterbury estates that year, and in 1900 a part of Ewing Township was annexed to the city, including both estates.

The Cadwalader estate dates back to 1776, when Lambert Cadwalader purchased the property at a sheriff's sale. His lands extended from the Delaware River to Scotch Road and from Overbrook Avenue to Dean Avenue, for a total of 248 acres.

An 80-acre portion of the estate had passed to Henry Farlee, who lived in Eliarsile, by the time Edmund C. Hill convinced the city to acquire the land for a park in 1888. Later that year, the city bought an eight-acre strip of land from the Cadwalader family, the present site of Junior 3. Three years later, an additional seven and seventenths acres adjoining the park's eastern boundary and running along the west side of Parkside Avenue from Stuyvesant Avenue to the canal feeder, was acquired. Later, the city also bought a 15-acre parcel adjoining the park, facing Stuyvesant, from the state

GENERAL MEETING - MAY 12


The Hiltonia Association General Membership Meeting was held on Tuesday, May 12 at the home of Betty Walton. We had a good turnout and the guest speaker was Dallas Dixon who has been organizing the Guardian Angels in Trenton. The Guardian Angels are a varied and interesting group of people who will be helping to guard areas of Trenton. They are starting by guarding the Trenton Train Station on weekend evenings. They carry no arms or weapons but travel in groups of no less than eight and will help to prevent muggings, etc. They have been well received in many cities across the country and so far have been well received in Trenton.

Stuyvesant Avenue, created by city ordinance of September I, 1885, was extended past Parkside Avenue by an ordinance passed February 10,1889 in 1885, Stuyvesant was still a country road and Hillcrest Avenue was only a lane running from the Farlee farm to the railroad station. All the rest was fields.

But with the extension of Stuyvesant, the Hillcrest area expansion began. Added impetus came from the furthering of the trolley line from State Street up Prospect and out Stuyvesant, a path still traveled by city buses.

Cadwalader Place, a 75-acre tract from Overbrook to Parkside Avenue, between the river and the feeder, was purchased by Hill in 1891, and laid out for him by Oimsted. It was the first prestige development associated with the park.

Once the park land on the Stuyvesant side was acquired, houses were built there, too. And the surrounding of the park went full circle in 1925, when Hiltonia opened with a big ad campaign touting it as "the" place to live.



A discussion on establishing a neighborhood compost pile so that neighbors could disgard their leaves, grass clippings, etc. concluded with Eunice Levy agreeing to check further on this idea. A HOUSING DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION FOR TRENTON

As you may recall, about six months ago the Hiltonia Association in cooperation with other civic associations developed a proposal for funding under the city's Community Development Block Grant Program. The essence of the proposal was to acquire and rehabilitate the entire Northern blockface of Colonial Avenue for resale to eligible low or moderate income households. The proposal was submitted to the City under the aegis of the Trenton Council of Civic Associations who agreed to act as the project sponsor. Although this project was not funded per se, the concept was melded into another project which the City had been working on. This project is known as the Housing Development Corporation.

Serious efforts are now underway to organize a non-profit corporation which would accomplish the same goals as the Trenton Council of Civic Associations had in mind. This corporation would begin with City-owned, vacant abandoned housing in one of several key target areas. Since the target areas have not yet been formally selected and the details of how the corporation will work not yet determined, I am going to revive the original group that put together the TCCA proposal. If you were not part of that group but would like to volunteer your services now, please call me. We will be meeting regularly and often until this project gets off the ground and rehab becomes a reality.

The following letter was published in the Trenton Times to thank the police for their attentive patrolling and to advertise the fact that Hiltonia has an ACTIVE Crime Watch.

Dear Editor:

With the March 23 issues of both Time and Newsweek featuring crime as a major problem in theUnited States, it is too easy to say either that's one one should do something', or else to blame the police for not stopping the criminals.

It is nice to be able to report that someone is doing something, and also to thank the police in this one brief letter about two separate incidents.

First: The Hiltonia Crime Watch had its first success. A watchful participant saw two criminals attempting to break into a neighbor's house and called the police, thereby folling a potential break-in. Neighbors watching out for neighbors is something everyone can do.

Second: Trenton Patrolmen Kondopka and Bunting spotted a car in an unusual location in Hiltonia and stopped to investigate. Their careful follow-up, uncovered two individuals with criminal records who were subsequently arrested after an extensive search and chase. The careful, thoughtful investigation by these patrolmen probably saved us from a trouble-some situation. Thank you

While these two separate examples don't solve the crime problems in Trenton, they are indications that people can help control crime by being observant and contacting the police, and that police do care and are fighting crime in a professional manner.

Please recognize that we've had few incidents since the institution of the Hiltonia Crime Watch. Whether or not there is a cause and effect, let's be thankful for the need for less activity of the Crime Watch Network.

P.S. If you are part of the Crime Watch Telephone Network, be sure that you were called about the Schragger incident. If you were not called, please call the person above you on the network and tactfully ask why.

Not only did we have to contend with a drought, we also have to contend with the Trenton Water Works. As you are all aware, we have received water bills for the first time this year. The last meter reading occurred on February 26 which means that our meters should be read on or about May 26. On a phone call (May 21) to the City Meter Reading Department, it was learned that the meters are not scheduled to be read - they are busy working in Hamilton.

We should be concerned about Trenton's inability to read meters and bill us, since we seem to be hit with constant rate hikes. The more money they collect the slower they are becoming. This has to be costly to us. Where is the money coming from to pay the Water Works' bills? Is it coming from our property tax? Why was the meter read on February 26, yet the bill didn't arrive until May 18?


