# HILTONIA ASSOCIATION - General Membership Meeting May 4, 1982

The May general membership meeting was held at the home of Pat and Sal Flores of Renfrew. The Program for the evening was about the proposed plans for the new Vroom Building. The guest speakers for the evening were Dr. Harvey Musikoff, Chief Executive Officer of Trenton Psychiatric Hospital, Mr. Pat Ristin, Planner - Architect with the New Jersey Department of Human Services and Professor C. Karalis, Architect Designer of the Project.

Dr. Musikoff stated that the study for the new Forensic Facility was begun approximately 5 years ago by Ann Klein, New Jersey State Commissioner of Human Services. This site was chosen because of it's central geographic location for a State Facility. There is a need for treatment in an environment that is safe and secure for the patient who interfaces with the law. The Department of Correction and Department of Human Services are working jointly on the design and staffing of this new facility. Feasibility studies are currently being done to update the cost of building, staffing and security of the proposed project. The replacement building is being planned to house the same number of clients or less than the current Vroom Building.

A discussion was held on the following points:

1. Project approval stage.

2. Hiltonia residents concern for security.

3. Number of clients and possibility of expansion.

4. Cost.

5. Exact location of building (not decided).

6. Placement of additional prisoners from the present Vroom Building over and above the space allocated in the new facility.

7. External perimeter - electronic.

At the next meeting of the executive board, it will be decided how and when to meet with Dr. Musikoff for ongoing information. There are still many unanswered questions.

#### CADWALADER PARK THEN AND NOW

A great aunt of mine who lives on West Farrell Avenue in Trenton, New Jersey, has very fond memories of Cadwalader Park in its early years.

About 75 years ago, there was an open air trolley that went through town. One of the stops was near Cadwalader Park. People used to bring lunches packed in shoe boxed and spend the day in the park.

She was impressed by the beautiful garden and especially the ones that spelled out the name Cadwalader Park. Greenhouses, which were located on the property, provided the flowers.

Back then, there was no playground to amuse the children. They knew how to amuse themselves by rolling down the grassy hills, and frequently in their "Sunday best." The boys and fathers would play ball, while the women and girls would sit on the benches and talk to friends who wandered by. They used to walk across wooden walkbridges. There was a little place were people could go and visit the monkeys and the snakes. She disliked the snakes. There was no duck pond back then.

Later in the afternoon the children would purchases some ice cream for five cents. She remembers buying it at a large house with tables and chairs on the veranda.

The people liked the park so much, they would slao bring their supper along with them sometimes.

Many schools would often have the end of the year picnic in the park. A trip to the park was a nice outing because they had no cars to take them long distances. As she grew older, she remembers the duck pond and playground with swings and merry go round. During the holdiays, there was the Fourth of July Fireworks and at Christmas, there was a Nativity Scene.

Visitors who came to see you were always taken to the park to enjoy its beauty.

Today there are no trolleys. Now people bring cars and dump bottles and paper in the park. Many people are afraid to spend the day at the park. The greenhouses are still in existence but are heavily vandalized, therefore, there are few flowers. Today Cadwalader Park has a playground to amouse the children but the merry-go-round is gone. Once in a while, the boys and fathers play ball. The park has two wooden bridges. The monkeys are still there but the origingal home is now a comfort station. Today they have a duck pond that contains water, bottles, paper, mud, rocks and ducks. The ice cream parlor is now Ellarslie Mansion. This is being restored and converted into a city museum.

A group called Friends of Cadwalader Park is trying to preserve the beauty of Cadwalader Park by getting together people on certain days to clean up the park.

They are also interested in preserving the trees, shrubs, pond, and rock gardens. We should all do our part to make it beautiful once again.

#### CADWALADER PARK

#### Was it fun to go the park when you were little?

Yes, it was a pleasure. We looked forward to going to the park because our pastor took us on a picnic after school. Mothers and younger children came along for the day and it was great fun.

#### Did they have any animals?

Cadwalader Park in the late thirties had a monkey house, the bear's den and exotic birds. They were wonderful to see because we did not have T.V. and were not privileged to seed such things otherwise.

#### Did you stay there all day?

Yes. Our mother would pack enough food for the entire day.

#### Did you play any games while you were there?

Yes. There, were all sorts of games and races. I especially like the three legged race and rolling down the many hills in the park. Also, the peanut scramble was a happy time for us all. Our pastor purchased a huge burlap bag of peanuts and scattered them into the air. We would all fall to the ground and collect as many as we could. There were always plenty to go around!

#### Was there any food?

Our pastor gave us a cup of ice cream. It was a rare treat for us.

# When you were older did you still go to the park?

When I was in high school in the forties, my girlfriends and I would ride a bus to the park on Sundays. This was during the World War and there was gas rationing so folks stayed close to home. The park would be full of many families picnicing, and servicemen just look for company.

#### Did you meet any of the men?

My friends and I met young men from all over the country. Even some from England and France. Since they were young also, far from home and usually short on funds, they would head for Cadwalader Park on Sundays.

#### Was the park crowded?

The park was always full of people and very few cars.

#### Was the park nice?

Yes. Because people did not drink beer and liquor in the park nor did they litter. The park was a place of beauty, full of magnificent flower beds and trees of every kind.

# Did you talk to anyone while you were at the park?

Yes. The servicemen. We would sit all afternoon and talk to them.

#### After you got married did you go to the park?

After I married and had children we would all go after Sunday mass to visit Cadwalader Park and feed the animals. Every Easter I would take pictures of the children in their Easter outfit in the park.

#### What do you think about the park now?

In recent years when I have had occasion to drive through the park I felt sad. The flower beds are trampled, trees fallen and people acting in nasty, loud manner, drinking and using foul language.

#### How do you feel about that?

Cadwalader Park has fallen on bad times I fear.

# CADWALADER PARK

I interviewed my grandmother, Mrs. Raymond Schroth, who recalled that our cousin, Alice Kusar and her brother, Bill and Mother and Father and Grandmother lived at Ellarslie and ran an ice cream concession stand, during the early 19 hundreds, at the turn of the century.

My grandmother remembers the Cadwalader Park as a daily place to go with children. It was famous for its beautiful trees, flower beds, its island with a weeping willow in the center of the pond and beautiful flowering cherry trees.

It had a beautiful playground, pony rides and animals to feed.


In the evening, band concerts such as the famous Winkler Band were held in the open air theatre. Often famous men would come from different parts of the country to speak on politics or other issues of the times.

The cars took the same roads that we have today. However, the entrance to the park had large red flower urns filled with beautiful flowers at the main entrance.

The tennis courts were famous for being the only clay courts in the area. They were used by many great locak tennis players. Tennis tournaments were held there on weekends.

In the last 1950's a "Theatre In the Park" was started. Broadway musicals and dramas were put on by the well known producer and director Lee Yapp. All of his productions received great acclaim and were supported by local theatre goers including my mother and father.



# EARLY YEARS AT CADWALADER PARK

This interview was with Mr. Francis Kiernan. He lives at 105 Buckingham Avenue.

He remembers a variety of different places and events that used to be in Cadwalader Park, around 1928. He was about ten years old.

First, he remembers that during the winter months there was plenty of sledding. One particular hill had a road at the bottom. On snowy days, this road was roped off, so sledding could be enjoyed.

During the summer, believe it or not, their "swimming hole" was the canal.

Mr. Kiernan and his family used to go the park almost every Sunday. Sometimes they went on weekdays when it was warmer.

He remembers what is now the city museum Ellarsle as a monkey house. It housed monkeys, bears, colorful birds like parrots and cockatoos, they even had a laughing hyena. He recalls there used to be pony rides up by the crossroads, where the balloonman now stands. Also, he remembers the words Cadwalader Park spelled out in flowers by the side of the canal.

Down by the swings - which haven't moved - there used to be a soda stand.

One thing he misses and wishes would be returned is the Band Shell. Here dirrerent bands and guest soloists came to perform plus, admission was free.

He saya there were many, many more trees, and the maintenance was much better. He recalls that there was two-way traffic on the narrow crushed stone road-ways.

Back then he says that the park was onehundred times prettier than it is now, and, he wishes it were that way again.

#### **NEWCOMER'S PACKAGE**



#### **GYPSY MOTHS**

Though the gypsy moth invasion is not as bad this year as it was thought to be, the gypsy moth catepillars are still going to cause some destruction during the next few weeks. When the catepillars are newly hatched, they are ¼ inch long, black and fuzzy. By their second stage of growth, they are approximately 1 inch long, have a muted stipr down the back, are fuzzy and have swollen or enlarged heads. (This is the stage reached during the beginning of June.) The full grown gypsy moth catepillar is 1-1/2 to 2 inches and two distinct spotted lines down its back. One line is red spots and the other blue spots. Hopefully, you will not see them this size because by this growth stage, they will have done a lot of damage.

Barbara Bromley, of the Mercer County Extension Service, after giving the description said that spraying with SEVIN as high up a tree as you can get will kill the catepillars. It is too late for any biological sprays. The catepillars prefer birch, apple and oak trees, followed by hemlock and white pine but will feast on anyting if they get hungry enough.

By early July, the catepillar will reach the moth stage by wrapping in a cocoon and hiding under picnic table, on the bottom side of tree branches or in almost any protected spot. The female moths are flightless but the flying males locate the females who in turn will lay their egg masses. If you find these egg masses, you can scrape them off but don't throw them in the garbage, on the ground, etc. Place the egg mass in kerosene or alcohol otherwise they will hatch.

Remember, it is possible that in a few years Hiltonia can be leafless. Some of your neighbors can tell you what that is like.


Editor's Note: The day after I wrote this story, my daughter, Amy's friend, Susan showed up at the back door holding a gypsy moth catepillar. It was very fuzzy, about I inch long and skinny, had a large head (proportionately larger than most catepillars) and you could barely make out the beginnings of a red spotted strip on the black or almost black body. Above Susan's head was a birch tree. I explained to the children about how destructive gypsy moths are, then we laid it to rest with much difficulty and much necessity. Gypsy moth catepillars are in Hiltonia.

#### **AZALEAS**

Two years ago, The Hilltone published an article on azaleas. Once again azalea gall, a fungus disease can be found on the azaleas. As a reminder, azalea gall is a fungus that attacks azalea leaves and leaves little white balls in their place. The best remedy is to break off the affected pieces since there is no chemical remedy once the fungus starts. You can prevent the fungus by spraying FERBAM or ZINC B as the leaves unfurl in early spring. If you have any questions, call the Mercer County Extension Service at 989-6830.

# TENT CATEPILLARS

The tent catepillars have completed their eating season. Though not as destructive at the gypsy moth catepillars, they do their share of leaf eating with their favorite trees being apple and cherry. You can see their breeding grounds by locating a tent-like spider web in your tree.



#### GARBAGE AT OUR BACK DOOR?

The Mercer County Improvement Authority has recommended that the regional garbage dumping site be located in Ewing Township behind the Roller Bearing Company off of Sullivan Way. The Hiltonia Association Executive Board has decided to make the Mercer County Board of Freeholders aware of the fact that the site in question is too close to too many residential areas, therefore we are opposed to the location.

If you are opposed to this location, you should make the Board of Freedholders aware of your opposition. There will be numerous meetings held to activate a Ewing Group Against Garbage and other meetings to discuss the problems. Can you attend?

Garbage is a problem that is here to stay. A location must be found that is near the least amount of residential areas and is easily accessed by grabage turcks. The environment cannot be overlooked. What is your opinion?


