RADAR SPEED CHECKS REQUESTED

The following letter was voted on and approved at the May 11th General Membership Meeting. It will be sent concurrent with its publication in the Hilltone.

Dear Lt. Reister,

In a recent telephone conversation with Mr. Waldron concerning speeding within Hiltonia he suggested I write to you requesting periodic radar checks in the neighborhood.

The Hiltonia Association has received numerous complaints from residents about the excessive rate of speed of vehicles not only on Stuyvesant Avenue and Hilvista Boulevard but also on the other streets within Hiltonia. These residents have expressed concern for the safety of individuals; we have over one hundred children in the neighborhood; and a fear of property damage.

If we could periodically have radar checks within the neighborhood during commuting hours, 7 to 9 AM and 4 to 6 PM, and on weekends we feel it would decrease the incidence of speeding and therefore increase safety within Hiltonia.

COMPARING WINTERS



For Your Information Child Restraint Systems New Jersey Law

New Jersey Law Chapter 128, Laws of 1983 requires every person transporting a child under the age of 5 in a motor vehicle within the State to secure the child in an approved child restraint system. If the child is over 18 months he may be secured with a safety belt in the rear seat.

Any person found guilty of violating this law shall be fined not less than \$10.00 and not more than \$25.00.

PARK POLICING

Here is point of view about the policing of Cadwalader Park. This letter appeared in one of our local newspapers.

Regarding the story, "Council: Give Park to County," we would like to inform city Council and Council President Armenti about the Park Commission's inability to maintain Cadwalader Park. The Park Commission's police force is presently undermanned and ill-equipped to handle a park like Cadwalader.

The present park police force is down from an effective 12-man force to a scant 3-man force. This shortage is due to attrition and the park commission's lack of desire to hire more police.

We used to provide 24-hour protection; but are now barely covering the 8-4 and 4-12 shifts.

Before Council can open negotiations with the county it should be aware that the park commission can do a great job of upkeeping and maintaining the park. But with its present undermanned force and the untrained Ranger system it could never do the job expected of it.

We wonder if the present budget cuts to save the taxpayer a few dollars are worth jeopardizing the safety and well being of the thousands of children and adults who use the park commission facilities.



There is a leash law in our town, but our neighbors, like many others, paid no attention to it. The dog had to be destroyed and, of course, so is our long-time friendship with the neighbors.


The insurance company will not pay their claim because they failed to honor the leash law. That dog never should have been off their property. They will have to handle the lawsuit on their own, which means they will lose their home. Meanwhile, they are furious with us, but their daughter is alive and ours is dead. We would consider the loss of our home trivial compared with the loss of our precious girl, but naturally they don't see it that way.
